










CUBISM application **Spacial perception**













Custom-made VR - to practice specific work skills in her real work



- A person with intellectual disability
- Considered unemployable, first job at 37
- Training problem spots on the route –
- in the middle of the street, but warm, sitting down
- Involvement of the client in the creation of the video = strengthening the learning effect
- Works independently



















FAMILIARITY WITH THE ENVIRONMENT



- A client with a psychological disorder
- Before the outbreak of the disease, she worked all her life, never at the Labour Office
- Fear and anxiety of an unknown environment reduced thanks to a virtual tour









Cooperation with special and practical schools

- Using 1-2 headsets at the same time.
- Possibility of using an interactive whiteboard.
- Also involvement of students with moderate intellectual disabilities and PAS




